Bob Crelin • Illustrated by Leslie Evans

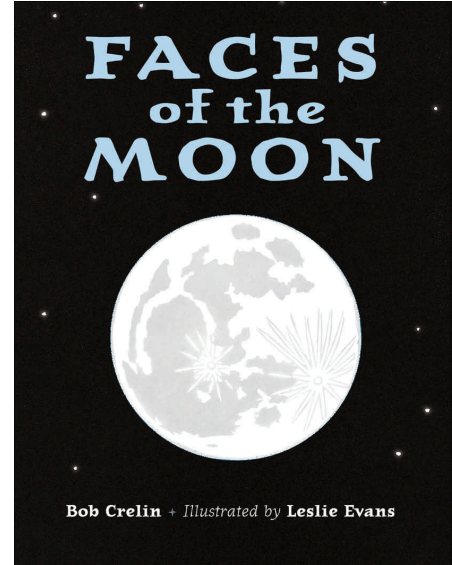
***Do you wonder, when you see the Moon,
